The New UU ~a Tapestry of Faith one day event


New to the church? Been around a while but are still filled with questions about just what it is about UUism that united us together?


(The Agony of Violence by Lamont Steptoe)

Andrew Bacevich, the BU professor and former Army colonel who spoke at First Parish a couple of years ago, is the author of Washington Rules: America's Path to Permanent War. He describes the "faith" of the American military and political establishment as comprised by two quasi-sacred articles. The first article of faith he calls "the American credo" – articulated in 1941 by Life Magazine's right-wing publisher Henry Luce who declared the 20th century to be "the American century" and urged Americans "to accept wholeheartedly our duty to exert upon the world the full impact of our influence for such purposes as we see fit and by such means as we see fit." Flowing from this is the second article of "faith," that the US must maintain "military capabilities staggeringly in excess of those required for self-defense."

Bacevich then describes three doctrines – he calls them a "trinity" – that flow from these articles of faith. The first is that the US must absolutely maintain "a global military presence."

Bridging Ceremony for Charlie Mathis

One of the most important things we can do for our youth is to support



The Bridging Ceremony celebrates the transition of our youth from their high school experience into young adulthood. Charlie Mathis graduates from Sherman High School on June 4th and on Sunday, June 5th the congregation will honor Charlie in a Bridging Ceremony, a UU rite of passage.

After things everyone is invited to a reception celebrating Charlie's Bridging from youth to adult.

The second is that "the US must configure its forces for global power projection." The third is that these forward-deployed forces must always be ready to "counter anticipated threats by relying on a policy of global interventionism."

Bacevich regards this faith as irrational, dangerous and self-destructive. Provocatively, he concludes, "This reliance on military might creates excuses for the United States to avoid serious engagement. Confidence in American arms has made it unnecessary to attend to what others think or consider how their aspirations might differ from our own. In this way Washington rules reinforce American provincialism – a national trait for which the United States continues to pay dearly...fixing Iraq and Afghanistan ends up taking precedence over fixing Cleveland and Detroit."

That we succeeded in killing bin Laden does not surprise me, but I am neither buoyed nor re-assured. I fear that, yet again, we have created an excuse to avoid the underlying issues. Bin Laden's death makes it seem less necessary, as Bacevich says, "to attend to what others think or consider how their aspirations might differ from our own."

I mourn – not bin Laden – but the insanity of permanent war.

Financial Update ~the treasurer's report

"Our June Share the Plate will benefit the Sherman Crisis Center." April income for RRUU was \$2,065.30 and expenses were \$3,158.44 resulting in a net loss for the month of \$1,093.06.

The Annual Stewardship Campaign continues to have activity concerning annual giving. As of mid-May the total pledged for FY 12 was \$15,060. At that time, 13 giving units (15 individuals) had yet to respond with a pledge or notification they are unable to pledge at this time. The \$84.50 Share the Plate

offering gathered in April went to Your Neighbor's House in Whitesboro (see thank-you elsewhere in this newsletter). Our May 8th cash offerings went to Big Brothers/Big Sisters and in June we will *Share the Plate* with the Sherman Crisis Center which serves all of Grayson County.

End of the fiscal year accounting is in process to close out FY11. Marie Bellman, elected as Treasurer beginning July 1, has been acquainting herself with the

accounting laptop and practicing using Quick-Books. She has also learned quickly how to set up the paper copies of monthly accounting, create computer generated monthly reports and tend to the multitude of little details of her new position. It has been a joy to work with her and Marie promises to be an attentive and enthusiastic treasurer for our church!

Ware Lecture: "The Challenge of Compassion"



Karen Armstrong is one of the world's leading commen-

tators on religious affairs and a best-selling author, whose books have been translated into forty-five languages. Her early work focused on the monotheistic faiths of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam, but she has since begun to explore the eastern religions. Since September 11, 2001, Karen Armstrong has become chiefly known for her work on Islam and Fundamentalism, particularly in the United States. She has addressed members of the United States Congress and the Senate on three occasions, has participated in the World Economic Forum in New York and Davos, has spoken at study days at the United Nations and at the NATO Naval Defense College in Rome, and has addressed the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington and New York. She has also advised members of the Dutch parliament about Islam and the integration of Muslim communities in Europe.



She is increasingly invited to address audiences in the Muslim world. In 2007 she was awarded a medal for Arts and Sciences by the Egyptian government for her services to Islam, the first foreigner to have been awarded this decoration. In the summer of 2007, she was invited by the Malaysian government to speak in Kuala Lumpur, even though her books are banned there. She also spoke at the Young Presidents' Organization in Istanbul and later that year she gave the keynote address at an international conference on Islamophobia there. In January 2008, she visited Pakistan, where she gave lectures on Islam in Lahore, Islamabad and Karachi.

In this lecture, Karen Armstrong will argue that compassion and the Golden Rule have been central to all the major faiths, will explore the reasons for this, and argue that an ideology that does not restore compassion to the center of the spiritual, religious and ethical life fails the test of our time.

The Ware Lecture was named to honor three generations of the distinguished Ware family. The Reverend Henry Ware, Sr., became in 1805 the liberal, but controversial, Hollis Professor of Divinity at Harvard, precipitating the Unitarian movement. His son, Henry Ware, Jr., was a minister and one of the general founders of the American Unitarian Association. The grandson of the third generation, John Fothergill Waterhouse Ware, was a distinguished Boston Minister.


