# DRUG WAR: HOW WE GOT INTO THIS MESS AND THE VESTED INTERESTS THAT KEEP US HERE Suzanne Willis

As we define "the drug war," it does NOT include education, prevention or treatment. The drug war has attempted to co-opt these important tools and made them less effective. Money is being spent in ways that are up to 23 times less effective than available alternatives. We are making remarkably bad investment decisions. Dear Friends,

The English playwright, Arnold Bennett said it best, "Any change, even a change for the better, is



always accompanied by drawbacks and discomforts." Keeping that in mind, I have good news and bad news about our current location.

Red River Unitarian Universalist Church needs to move. The board and others in the church have been looking at various places. In that process we contacted Temple Beth Emeth. After much deliberation, the congregation at Temple Beth Emeth decided they did not want to share their space. Now the board is continuing to look. Doyle Adams has found we could rent the meeting room at the Texoma Inn quite inexpensively. Joyce Peak has looked at many of the places in Denison that are for rent. So far there has been nothing which we can afford on the 2011-2012 budget. The board would appreciate any other leads or ideas from anyone in the congregation.

Meanwhile back at the current building, Bettye Hales Russell, our landlady, has decided to put it up

for sale again. She wants to refinish the ceiling in the Sanctuary, and paint each of the rooms along the corridor which have been used by Day Star. To achieve that goal she has requested we move out of the Sanctuary for some period of time. We will use one of the classrooms as an office, another for Adult Forum, and a third for storage of anything currently in the sanctuary which we choose not to use. The Fellowship Hall will be set up for use as a Sanctuary.

Good news - our rent from now on is \$500.00 per month with an additional \$100.00 per month for utilities. We will be on a month to month lease, but since we have always had a one month out on the lease this isn't much of a change.

Bad News – Bettye wants to begin these projects as soon as possible. To that end we need to move all of our stuff out of the sanctuary.

Bettye's plan of upgrade.

- Remove the "popcorn" and repaint the sanctuary ceiling
- Paint five of the classrooms that Day Star had been using
- Put either a solid door or a wall in the women's bathroom in the back stall
- Possibly put a partial wall and door to hide the commode in the men's bathroom
- Remove the Day Star sign and paint under it. Remove the RRUU sign temporarily to paint under it but put it back up.
- Bettye is asking \$135,000 for the building - that does not include any of the furniture.

# What we need to do this Sunday, July 3rd

 set up the old sound system in the sanctuary or figure out how to attach the new speakers, setting them on the floor so we have a sound system for Sunday morning worship.

### Then after services ...

- move the current office in the back of the sanctuary to one of the rooms on the back wall - probably the purple one.
- set up the yellow room for adult forum meetings
- use a third room for storage of anything from the sanctuary we won't need right now (dividers immediately come to mind)
- remove all wall hangings and pictures from the sanctuary walls.
- move six to eight of the pews from the sanctuary down to the fellowship hall.
- move the small lectern to the fellowship hall
- move the candles of communion to the fellowship hall
- move the pianos one to fellowship hall, one to a storage room
- make sure we have found a temporary home for everything that we own that was in the sanctuary.

We will be in the fellowship hall until the work is complete – while there is no time line right now, I think we can anticipate several weeks. Once we return to the sanctuary, our rent will be \$750.00, plus \$100.00 toward utilities.

### The Adult Forum ~"Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life"

For the next several weeks the Adult Forum will focus on a far-reaching thesis offered by Dr. Karen Armstrong (author of The Case for God). It takes courage for a religious historian and writer of Dr. Karen Armstrong's stature to step out from behind the scrim of scholarship and analysis to offer guidelines for a spiritual practice designed to make humanity a kinder and saner species. Armstrong has composed a Charter for Compassion, which calls for the restoration of "compassion to the heart of religious and moral life" in a "dangerously polarized" world. Exquisite and affecting explications of

Buddhist, Confucian, Judaic, Christian, and Islamic commentary prepare the ground for meditation exercises meant to engender "open-mindedness" and the cultivation of compassion, making for the most sagacious and far-reaching 12-step program ever. The schedule (always open to revision once we get into the book) looks like this:

July 3: Wish for a Better World July 10: Learn About Compassion & Look at Your Own World July 17: Compassion for Yourself & Empathy

July 24: Mindfulness & Action July 31: How Little We Know & How Should We Speak to One Another

**Aug 7**: Concern for Everybody & Knowledge


**Aug 14**: Recognition & Love Your Enemies & A Last Word


The Hills were also among a few hundred UU's who marched from the Convention Center to Marshall Park in Charlotte to support the cause of LGBT rights in the U.S. and in Uganda, in particular voicing opposition to proposed legislation that would ban marriage equality in North Carolina (the only state in the South that has not already written discrimination against LGBT families into its state constitution).

RRUU received special recognition at a reception held by the UU-UNO (Unitarian Universalists at the United Nations Organization) as one of 21

Blue Ribbon congregations honored for their support of the organization (holding a special UU-UNO service, donating money, etc.). RRUU was in high-powered company, as two neighboring congregations (both much larger than RRUU)--First UU in Dallas and All Souls in Tulsa-were also honored. Elbert accepted the award given by Bruce Knotts, UU-UNO director for RRUU.

# Board Bits ~from the June 23<sup>rd</sup> Board Meeting

"We need to find a new home."

The board meeting was held on June 23rd. All members were present with the exception of Penny Armstrong.

New board members Richard Newlin and Kat Walston were also in attendance while Elbert Hill was representing RRUU at GA.

In addition to normal board business the following topics were covered.

- Spring Congregational Meeting – Review of the meeting, what we learned from it
- Budget 2011-2012 Incorporate the 10,000 the congregation authorized to be spent from savings if necessary for worship and the increased pledges. Board will review for a week and then it will be distri-

buted to the congregation for approval.

- Goals 2011-2012 review of the changes in the goals as authorized by the membership. Will be distributed to the congregation at the same time as the budget for approval.
- Concerns voiced from Pledge Drive – Discussion of how the process was accomplished and what could have happened instead of what did.
- Need to find a new home. Temple Beth Emeth is no longer a possibility. Texoma Inn has some potential for a temporary meeting place. Joyce Peak has done lots of research of what is available in the Denison area.

The next board meeting is July 19th, starting at 6:40 p.m. Board meetings are open to all, if you wish to be on the agenda please contact a board member. Deadline for the agenda and reports to the board is July 12th. Those wishing a few minutes during the "open mic" will want to be ready to speak around 7:00 pm.

### Facebook ~Come, "like" us and become a fan

One of the exciting outcomes of the recent Standing on the Side of *Leadership* conference was a renewed nudge to create a church Facebook page.

It has happened and we're the newest UU facebook page around (we think).

So far ten people have clicked that they "like" us and are fans.

Once the exclusive domain of college students, Facebook has been creeping steadily into adult social networks, businesses, and groups. Founded in 2004, Facebook now has over 500 million people who use it, and a full 50% log onto their page every day.

New pages are created at the rate of 10,000 daily. Each user has a personal "page," where they can post personal information and photos. They can become "friends" with other Facebook users, send and

receive messages, and link themselves to their alma maters, workplaces, and any other group—such as a religious organization that has established a Facebook presence. Now we're one of those religious organizations!
