Manna from Maria

Dear Friends,

I have always enjoyed Christmas traditions but when I stumbled upon a Unitarian Universalist celebration that honored our seven principles and learned about the Seven Days of Chalice, I was impressed.

Who's to say that a new family ritual can't begin at any time? Sure, many of the traditions people bring to this time of year have been ongoing for eons, but here's a celebration which speaks directly to Unitarian Universalists.

Creating a new ritual certainly isn't new. Look at Kwanzaa, a celebration of African heritage. Dr. Maulana Karenga, professor and chairman of Black Studies at California State University, Long Beach, created Kwanzaa in 1966. After the Watts riots in Los Angeles, Dr. Karenga searched for ways to bring African-Americans together as a community. He founded US, a cultural organization, and started to research African "first fruit" (harvest) celebrations. Karenga combined aspects of several different harvest celebrations, such as those of the Ashanti and those

of the Zulu, to form the basis of Kwanzaa.

In the insuring 40+ years, Kwanzaa has become an intrigual part of American life - with songs, readings, videos and even a US postage stamp. Maybe it's our turn for a uniquely UU holiday!

If you've never heard of Chalica, you are not alone. It first emerged in 2005, from conversations that Daylene Marshall had with other young adults when she was a student at the Vancouver School of Theology in Vancouver, British Columbia.

But just like Christmas, the exact origins of this holiday are already lost to history. In her own words, Marshall said, "I don't remember where the initial conversation started. I had been talking with a UU friend from Seattle about winter holidays and the fact there should be a UU holiday. And we may have discussed the same thing in the young adults group at church." That would be the Unitarian Church of Vancouver.

"I went home after one of those discussions—that was probably November of 2005—and wrote something that I thought embodied our values" she said. "I sent it to a few friends and one of them created a Chalica website and it's grown from there."

I hope everyone will celebrate Chalice this year. It isn't a complicated holiday -

starting on Monday, Dec 5th take time during the day to light a candle and think of a way you can make our first principle come alive somehow. Then, each day during the week focus on a different principle and on Sun. Dec 11th we'll share the ways we each honored our principles.

Simple, yet significant at the same time. During the month we'll also celebrate Advent, Chanukah, Yule and of course Christmas - including a special service on Christmas eve.

I hope you have a joyous and fulfilling holiday season and I look forward to seeing you at church.

The Adult Forum ~Building Your Own Theology

During the month the Forum will continue exploring the UU curriculum **Building Your Own Theology.**

December 4th ~ We will conclude writing our spiritual autobiographies taking into consideration the eight prompts that were emailed to members last week. We will also draw four pictures of our visualization of "god" during childhood, youth, pre-UU, and "god" now. (Joyce Peak will lead this group.)

December 11th ~ We will share our spiritual autobiographies using approximately 5 minutes apiece, depending on how many are present. The conclusion will be for each person to very briefly tell what they learned from telling their stories and how it felt to share them. (Joyce Peak or Carolyn Cameron will lead this group.)

December 18th ~ The assignment this week is to write 10 convictions or habits to be learned by highly ethical people. You should probably think about this before Adult Forum, in order to be finished in time for everyone to

share their convictions. To get your thoughts flowing, the following information is quoted directly from BYOT, Richard S. Gilbert, 2000, The Unitarian Universalist Association.

"Hosea Ballou, that nineteenth-century Universalist preacher of universal salvation, was riding the circuit in the New Hampshire hills with a (different sect) minister one afternoon. They argued theology as they traveled. At one point, the (other) looked over and said, "Brother Ballou, if I were a Universalist and feared not the fires of hell, I could hit you over the head, steal your horse and saddle, and ride away, and I'd still go to heaven." Hosea Ballou looked over at him and said, "If you were a Universalist, the idea would never occur to you."

The Ten Commandments are listed below.

- I am the Lord thy God, ... Thou shalt have no other gods before me.
- Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven images.
- Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.
- Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy.

- Honor thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long.
- Thou shalt not kill.
- Thou shalt not commit adultery.
- Thou shalt not steal.
- Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.
- Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house.

We light our chalice for acceptance of one another and en-

couragement to spiritual growth in our congregations.

On this day reflect upon the way that you participate in your church community that helps yourself and others grow spiritually, you might make a gift of a hymnal to a friend or your congregation, recognize the way that other people's insights help you further along your own journey, extend words of peace or forgiveness to a fellow Unitarian .whom you may have hurt / not understood in the past.



Thursday, Dec. 8th ~

We light our chalice for a free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

This day is dedicated to awareness of our lifelong ability to grow and expand our minds. Keep on learning, teach someone something you know and love, support religious education, stretch your mind, and share books. Stay on the journey.



Friday, Dec 9th ~

We light our chalice for the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.

This day is dedicated to our healthy and balanced ways of governance. It is a good time to remember the founders of our democracy and to be proud of their connection to our historic movement. On this day, make your voice heard, but even more, find out ways to make the voices of those less powerful heard in the halls of power.



Saturday, Dec 9th ~

We light our chalice for the goal of world peace, liberty and justice for all.

The world in which we yearn to live is one which we shape and it is far away for most people. On this day, reflect upon the interconnections of all our lives, of our money and the livelihoods of others on the other side of the world. Board Bits ~from the Nov 16 th Board Meeting

Everyone on the board was in attendance. We started at 6:40 pm and went home around 9:00 pm. See full board minutes for details.

Don Durland acted as our Process Observer and timekeeper for the meeting. In addition to normal business, our agenda covered the following:

- Discussion of concerns presented in writing by Doyle Adams
- Discussion and Acceptance of the proposed Building Use Policy (which will soon be posted online at rruu.org on the governance page)
- Discussion of proposed bylaw changes and setting dates for town hall meeting in January 15 and Special Congregational Meeting on February 5

- Update on Board Retreat which will take place in January we are in the process of finding a consultant who will be available to assist with the retreat
- Review of October Congregational meeting.

If you would like to see the full board minutes – they will be posted in the "Board Meeting Book" in the office as soon as they are available. The next board meeting is Wednesday, December 14th, starting at 6:40 p.m. Board meetings are open to all, if you wish to be on the agenda please contact a board member. Deadline for the agenda and reports to the board is December 7th. Those wishing a few minutes during the "open mic" will want to be ready to speak around 7:00 pm.

Financial Update ~the treasurer's report

"Remember if you make a purchase for the church to use our tax exempt number. It sure saves a lot over the course of a year!" November was a bountiful month. Close to \$2,800 was given to RRUU in pledges and other weekly offerings, and the bills to operate the church came in at under that amount, at \$2,093. This left a surplus of about \$700.00 for upcoming church operations.

Due to our congregation's generosity, we were able to make several donations in November. The Second Sunday Share-the-Plate total was \$37.00, and it was sent to the Salvation Army Food Bank; \$40.00 was donated to the UU United Nations Office.

Several people have asked how much our utilities are running per month, and in November, they totaled \$294.31. We have budgeted \$360/month for utilities.

Church renovation news: another \$200.00 was added to the cash renovation fund and was used for the new ceiling fans in the chapel.

In November, \$9,950.74 was spent on church renovations. Items included service units for heat, heat filters, lumber, and large numbers of tools and supplies from Lowe's. By the end of November, the total of all checks written for the renovation was \$39,653.29. This leaves about \$24,550 remaining in the renovation fund.

I will be working on totaling up 2011 in-kind gifts for those in the church who have donated items to RRUU throughout the year. The gifts might be anything from food for a church event to postage stamps to a usage fee at the local dump.

Please give your receipts to me, and I will prepare paperwork that can be used for tax purposes.

P.S. Remember if you make a purchase for the church, please use our tax exempt number. While the tax may not be much on an individual purchase, it sure does add up over the course of a year. I can give you the number. A simple way to remember it is to put it in your cell phone call list so it is always readily available.

The Chapel ~ Pews, window screens and AV equipment

"The pews are have found a home with a tiny Anglican congregation in Houston and we now have \$3,000.00 to buy chairs for the chapel."

A member of a tiny Anglican congregation in Spring, TX saw our Craigslist ad offering our pews for sale. Several emails later - covering such important questions relating to the color of the cushions and what the fabric is; what the stain on the wood is and what it might cost for them to have kneelers installed we settled on a price for the lot of them - \$3,000.00.

The pews were loaded in a moving van on December first and taken south to their new home.

The money will be used to purchase new chairs for the chapel. Several companies have been

contacted. Among them is a company what makes their chairs right here in Texas.

You can look for some sample chairs coming over the next few weeks. The hope is to purchase fifty chairs, some with arms, some with a place to store hymnals, all with lumbar support.

Have you noticed that there is no longer a glare from the windows in the chapel? That's because each window has been fitted with solar screens - which will be a real help in reducing summer heat!

Our fancy audio and video system looks both impressive and complicated. While it is impressive, it is not complicated. Since we use it every week, volunteers are needed to learn how to operate it. If you're intrigued, don't be bashful - speak with anyone on the board about learning how to be an AV techie! It is a lot of fun.
