On Saturday, July 25, three of us from Red River—Marla Loturco, Donna Toerper, and I—traveled out to visit Hurst, Texas, just west of the DFW International Airport. We were there to attend a Small Church Conference hosted by Path-

ways UU Church, one of our sister congregations in NTUUC (North Texas Unitarian Universalist Congregations). David Pollard, president of the Board at Pathways, had noticed that there was more growth in the smaller congregations in our cluster than in the larger ones, and he thought it would be a good idea and worthwhile for the smaller congregations to talk to each other to discover what we were all doing right!

"critical mass" of children present every week. An experienced children's RE teacher, Theresa Wright from Pathways, discussed a number of possible scenarios for children at a small congregation. She presented four easy guidelines to keep in mind when planning and developing RE lessons and activities: (1) Have fun! (2) Everybody—students and teachers alike—should learn something; (3) There should be a "take-away," or something concrete or memorable to take home; and (4) Everybody should feel welcome, included, and important. Oh yes, and snacks—there should be snacks! Such down-home and basic guidance remove a good bit of apprehension and concern about having a very slick and very professional children's RE from the start. A little planning, a little good will, a little flexibility—and snacks!—will go a long way towards making families with children feel welcome and well looked-after.

And with that, I would like to extend my thanks and appreciation to the entire congregation for approving a revised Safe Congregation Policy for RRUU at our special Congregational Meeting last month. I am convinced that our new policy has all the appropriate safeguards for children's safety without being overly burdensome to a congregation our size. Special recognition and special gratitude are due to the members of the Committee on Ministry who agreed to serve in a dual role as the Safe Congregation Panel should the need arise: L.D. Clark, Carole Harner, and Gerry Shehan. We're only able to "do church" and "be church" because of the time, treasure, talent, and dedication of all our members, and I am grateful to all of you.

Board Bits

During the July 10th Board meeting, the Board:

- Voted to hold regularly scheduled meetings on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. The next meetings are scheduled for August 12, September 9, October 14, November 11, and December 9. Meetings in 2016 have not yet been officially set.
- Agreed to sell some of our red chairs, which had come to us from Community UU Church in Plano, at the church yard sale on July 11.
- Reviewed the proposed budget for FY 2015-16 and the second revision of the Safe Congregation for presentation at the Congregational Meeting on July 12.
- Named Dan as authorized wedding officiant for RRUU under Texas State law.
- Reviewed the previous year's covenant, and re-adopted it for 2015-16.
- Discussed installing a high quality acoustical tile ceiling in the chapel as a priority for a future NTUUC grant.

Additionally:

- Dan expressed his intention to call a taskforce to review the church's Bylaws for revision.
- Elbert raised the possibility of holding a Moveable Feast in Munson Park in late September or early October.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of June, we had income of \$3,084 from general operations. After operations expense of \$2128 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$955.

In June we received \$80 in donations for the Wi-Fi fund.

For the year to date period of July 2014 through March 2015, we had net income of \$955. The total change in cash for the year to date period was a decrease of \$121.

As of the end of June 2015, we had total cash of \$3,203. We had \$3,203 reserved for grants. Our unrestricted cash totals \$41,205 and our debt totals \$27,729.

In June, we donated \$699 from the Share the Plate program to the Earth Day Festival.

The Adult Forum for August

Aug. 2nd – Sombrero Galaxy, An Island Universe: one of the 20 brightest galaxies in the sky. The Hubble image provides a spectacular close-up view of



this nearly edge-on spiral, with its pronounced central bulge and tightly wound spiral arms. The very bright nucleus harbors a black hole of a billion star masses.

Aug. 9th – Hubble's View of Galaxies Near and Far: Hubble's Law and observation show that galaxies appear to be moving away from the Milky Way. The simple explanation is that we live in an expanding universe.

Aug. 16 – Evolution: Part 5 follows both Unitarianism and universalism though the late 19th and early 20th centuries as they evolve from Christian bible-oriented religions to our present-day non-creedal movement.

Aug. 23 – Evolution: Part 5, 2nd half, discusses influences as diverse as the Civil War, Feminism and Suffrage, Darwin's On the Origin of Species, and the Social Gospel.

Aug. 30 - The Antennae Galaxies — A Cosmic Collision: stars in our galactic halo exhibit streaming motions that indicate they were one part of smaller galaxies which have been disrupted by the gravity of the Milky Way. Over time, the Milky Way has captured a number of small galaxies and shredded them.
